## Chapter 5B: Alternative Water Supply Annual Report

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## INTRODUCTION

Due to the limitations that exist on development of traditional freshwater sources within the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD or District), most future increases in water needs will be met primarily through development of alternative water sources and conservation. Alternative water sources include nontraditional water supplies, such as brackish groundwater, surface water captured during wet weather, and reclaimed water. The District's program to support development of Alternative Water Supply (AWS) projects has been successful for more than a decade. Since 1997, this program has approved \$178.8 million for the construction of 437 AWS projects.

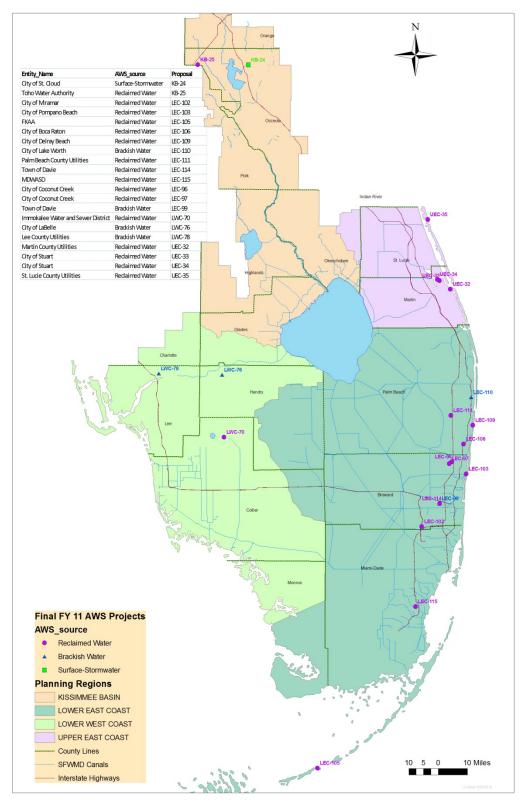
In 2005, the Florida legislature revised state law and created the Water Protection and Sustainability Program (WPSP) [Chapter 373, Florida Statutes, F.S.)], which established annually recurring state funding (that must be matched by the water management districts) to support AWS development. Pursuant to Chapter 373.707, F.S., legislation requires each water management district to submit an annual report to the Florida legislature and governor on AWS funding efforts. State and SFWMD matching funds are administered through the District's Alternative Water Supply Funding Program and are only available for construction.

Prior to 2005, the District had provided annual funding to entities pursuant to Chapter 373.707, F.S., which directed the water management districts to share their *ad valorem* tax revenues with public and private entities willing to develop suitable alternative water resources. During the three years preceding the WPSP legislation, Fiscal Years (FY) 2003 through 2005 (October 1, 2002, through September 30, 2005), the District funded 79 projects with \$14.8 million that created 106 million gallons per day (mgd) of additional alternative water supply capacity. From FY2006–FY2010, the District approved over \$141.6 million in funding (including WPSP funds) for 255 projects that created 400 mgd of additional alternative water capacity.

## FISCAL YEAR 2011 PROJECT FUNDING

Due to budget constraints at state and local levels, the State of Florida has not allocated funding for Alternative Water Supply projects in FY2011; however, the District has allocated \$6,050,000 in the FY2011 budget. In October 2010, the District's Governing Board approved \$2.6 million for five Big Cypress Basin Board projects. In November 2010, the Governing Board approved \$3.45 million to fund 19 projects from 36 applications received during the solicitation process for FY2011. These projects are designed to create an additional 11.5 mgd of alternative water supply capacity. **Figure 5B-1** illustrates the geographical distribution of AWS projects funded in FY2011, and **Table 5B-1** summarizes project details. Funding was awarded for construction that occurs between October 1, 2010, and August 31, 2011.

Because many projects are constructed over several years, water made available was reported in two parts: (1) the quantity of water to be made available during this phase (by August 31, 2011) and (2) the total water made available upon project completion. Of the 19 projects funded, five are multiyear projects. One of the multiyear projects will be completed in FY2011, while the other four will require reapplication for funding in subsequent years for future phases if funds are available. Additionally, distribution/transmission capacity made available by reclaimed water pipelines and pump stations is not included in the water made available, as this capacity would have been counted during the treatment plant construction (see footnotes of **Table 5B-1**).
